Maths

Number: Multiplication and Division

Fluency, Reasoning and Problem solving

Recall and use multiplication and division facts for multiplication tables up to 12×12

Use place value, known and derived facts to multiply and divide mentally, including: multiplying by 0 and 1; dividing by 1; multiplying together three numbers

Recognise and use factor pairs and commutativity in mental calculations

Multiply two digit and three digit numbers by a one digit number using formal written layout

Solve problems involving multiplying and adding, including using the distributive law to multiply two digit numbers by one digit, integer scaling problems and harder correspondence problems

- Gospel—What is the good news that Jesus brings?

Music:

To listen and respond to different genres of music

To learn technical vocabulary related to music

To continue to learn musical rhythms such as crochets, quavers, minims and semi breves and rests
